Greetings from the President

This summer will be a busy time for Telelaget members. We will have the opportunity to participate in our annual *stevne* and our Telemark tour.

The 2012 **7-Lag Stevne** will be held at the Olympia Resort and Conference Center in Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, from July 18th to the 21st. The *Stevne* is an annual gathering of descendants of immigrants from seven areas [bygd] of Norway located in Buskerud, Oppland, and Telemark counties. Each of these areas is represented by a "bygdelag" or "lag", for short. The six lag that will again participate in this year's stevne with Telelaget include those from the Land, Hadeland, Numedal, Ringerike-Drammen, Sigdal, and Toten areas of Norway.

The theme of this year' stevne is "A N o r w e g i a n Christmas in July" or "Jul i juli". The stevne will present many of the traditions that our Norwegian ancestors celebrated and ob-



served during the Christmas season. Many of these customs and foods have been continued by Norwegian Americans.

In addition to genealogical assistance, the *stevne* features entertainment including folk music and dance, classes, and opportunities to purchase Norwegian wares. A more detailed description of the *stevne*, a schedule, tour descriptions, and a registration form are contained on pages 8 through 11.

On Saturday morning, July 21 Telelaget will hold our annual meeting at the Olympia Center following the completion of the *stevne*.

Every five years beginning in 1992, Telelaget has conducted a tour of Telemark and some surrounding cities. The 2012 tour is scheduled from July 30 to August 9. The tour, which is described in more detail on the next page and on our Web site, arrives in Stavanger, travels through Telemark and ends in Oslo. A unique feature of this year's tour is the option to take a fivemountain hiking trek through the mountains of Setesdal and Western Telemark. The hiking opportunity is in keeping with Telelaget's goal of providing activities that are of interest to younger members. On a personal note: I am pleased that my daughter, Kristin, and my granddaughters Ashley, Meagan, and Kelsi will be able to join us on the tour. They will be participating in the hiking option.

We look forward to seeing you at the at the 2012 *7- Lag Stevne*. If you are unable to join us at this year's *stevne* or tour please plan on joining us on future stevner or Telemark tours. Past participants strongly endorse these experiences.

Forty-five to Participate in 2012 Telemark Tour

We are pleased to announce that 45 individuals have registered for our 2012 tour. The tour will be conducted from July 30 through August 9, 2012. The tour will begin in Stavanger, the oil capital of Norway. Stavanger hosts the recently built replica of the first immigrant ship to leave Norway, the *Restauration* (the "Norwegian Mayflower"). Tour participants will visit the harbor, we will get a taste of the conditions for those who sailed from Stavanger to America in 1825. They were the first group of Norwegians to emigrate to America. A tour aboard the *Restauration* is scheduled in Risør during the "Wooden Boat Festival." Another boat tour on the Lysefjord, which passes the *Prekestol* (Pulpit)- a crag 1,960 ft. above sea level—is also scheduled.

The tour will continue by bus north and east over the Hardangervidda to Telemark. A visit at the home of a literary "giant" Åsmund Vinje is planned. There will be visits at the Vemork Industrial Museum, the Heddal Stave Church, the Morgedal Ski Museum, and the Whaling Museum. In addition to staying several nights in Stavanger and Oslo at the end of the tour, nights will be spent in Hovden, Gaustablikk, Morgedal, and Skien.

Several days in Telemark will focus on individual visits to ancestral farms in Telemark that have been arranged by the tour director and Telelaget directors, Harald Omnes and Anne Haugen Wagn.

Twelve tour participants have elected the option of hiking in the mountains of Setesdal and western Telemark for five days. Two experienced Norwegian hiking guides, Tone Jorunn Tveit and Harald Omnes, will serve as guides. Tone was the spirited entertainer at the 2009 7-Lag Stevne in River Falls, WI. Harald, who is one of the Telemark representatives on the Telelaget Board of Directors, has 25 years experience as forest officer in Nor-

way. Hikers will stay in reserved cabins and lodges. Hiking in this beautiful mountain region should prove to be an unforgettable experience for our Telelaget hikers.

The tour will end in Oslo for all participants. There will be opportunities for extended stays in Norway.

Elaine Nordlie, who conducted the successful 2002 and 2007 tours, will again serve as tour director. Having resided in Norway for 15 years, Elaine has in-depth knowledge of Norway, particularly the Telemark region, and speaks fluent Norwegian.

Telemark to America Series Package Price

This past July, Telelaget published its third volume of the three-volume *Telelaget to America* series. *Volume I—Emigration* tells a complete story of Telemark emigration; *Volume II—Settlements* is rich with Telemark settlement history in Wisconsin, Iowa, and Minnesota; and *Volume III—Settlements, Biographies and Telemark Lore* contains more settlement history, emigrant biographies, and Telemark Folklore. Many of the chapters are translations from early *Telesoga* issues written by Torkel Oftelie, a Telelaget founder and author.

Collectively, the three volumes contain a great deal of information about our history and ancestry. They are an invaluable resource for us and for our descendants who are interested in our Telemark heritage. They reflect many hours of hard work in the research, writing, translation and publishing. The individual volumes are each about 200 pages in length and sell for \$20 per copy plus shipping and handling. At a recent meeting the Telelaget board of directors decided to offer the three volumes for a "package price" of \$50.

In Memory: Marv Bergland and Stan Oftelie

Marvin Edward Bergland, age 80, of Watertown, passed away on Tuesday, January 10, 2012. Marv served on the Telelaget Board of Directors from 1997 to 2004. He participated in Tours to Telemark in 2002 and 2007 and attended many annual *stevner*. Marv, who spent his career as an electrical engineer, spoke fluent Norwegian and would assist others with translation of documents to English. He was an avid outdoorsmen who took many hunting trips around the world.

Marv was born January 20, 1931 to Edward and Marie Bergland in Iron Mountain, Michigan. He grew up on a farm near Climax, Minnesota. He is survived by wife, Martha; children, Mark Kevin Bergland, Kristi Bergland and (Kjetil Drarvik); Funeral services were held at Trinity Lutheran Church, Watertown, and internment at Sand Hill Lutheran Cemetery, Climax, Minnesota.

Stanley Alfred Oftelie, 84, of Amana, IA, formerly of Grand Rapids, MN died on Thursday, May 26, 2011 in his home. Stan, a grandson of Telelaget founder Torkel Oftelie, was an active member of Telelaget. He enjoyed participating in the 2007 Telemark Tour with his son Jim.

Stan was born November 1926 in Fergus Falls, MN, of son Halvor and Ida (Weiby) Oftelie. He was a graduate Grand Rapids High School and served in the U. S. Army during WWII. He began

He was preceded in death by his wife, Sally Joan (Erskine) Oftelie. Memorial services were held at Trinity Lutheran Church in Walford. Final internment will be at the Itasca-Calvary Cemetery in Grand Rapids.

Gunnar Sønsteby Awarded Military Honors Cross

A recent article in the *Norwegian American Weekly* reported that on April 27, Gunnar Sønsteby was awarded the Military Honors Cross, which was established on January 30 by the Norwegian Armed Forces for their valuable contribution to the military.

Sønsteby is the first person in history to be awarded this decoration. He was chosen by Chief of Defense Harald Sunde for his timeless, continuous efforts for the military. Sunde stated, "He has been of crucial importance for the War Cross to be the nation's lasting decoration for bravery". Sønsteby is the only one who has been awarded the War Cross with three swords, making him Norway's most decorated citizen.

Until recently, he traveled around the country giving talks about his experiences as a resistance fighter from World War II. After the war he had also lectured throughout world. Sønsteby was delighted also that the Afgan security force that the Norwegian special forces have trained adopted his agent number 24.

Sønsteby was featured in the cover story in November 2010 issue of *Telesoga*. He visited Minnesota in 2010 to attend the opening night of the International Film Festival for showing of the WWII film, *Max Manus*.

Gunnar was born on January 11, 1918 in Rjukan, Telemark. This is where he spent his boyhood and where

his father ran a construction business. Rjukan is well known as the home of the famous Norsk Hydro, the site of heavy water production so important to the occupying Nazis in their effort to develop an atomic bomb.

[Sønsteby died in Oslo on May 10, 2012 at age 94.]

History of Stevner

Although most Telelaget members who have belonged to our organization for sometime are very familiar with our annual *stevne*, many new members have questions about the event. First of all, *stevne* is a term that is not often used in day-to-day language. A *stevne* [plural is *stevner*] is an annual conference or reunion where Norwegian-Americans, who are descendants of Norwegian ancestors from the same rural community (*bygd*), gather to celebrate their culture and history. At the *stevne*, genealogists and historians help attendees trace their ancestry and learn about the immigrant experience. In addition, there is entertainment including folk music and dance, classes, and opportunities to buy a variety of Norwegian wares.

During the early years of Telelaget, from 1914 to 1950, the focus of the annual *stevner* was primarily on social-

izing and renewing acquaintances. Most were immigrants who were interested in maintaining friendships with their Telemark neighbors. After Telelaget was reorganized in the late 1970s, genealogy became a major focus of the *stevne*. In keeping with a national interest in conducting family history during that time, many ethnic heritage groups began to provide resources and assistance for genealogical research. Computerized family tree programs and readily accessible data bases also facilitated family history research.

Because of common interests and for cost considerations, in 1986 Telelaget joined with six other *bygdelag* (Hadeland, Toten, Land, Numendal, Ringerike, and Sigdal) to sponsor a 7-Lag Stevne. Each *bygdelag* shares in programming, social activities, and banquet, but retains its own identity and conducts its own annual meeting.

Bus Transportation to Stevne

A charter bus from Fargo, North Dakota, leaving Wednesday, July 18 at noon for Oconomowoc, site of the 2012 7-Lag Stevne, is being proposed. Because of the long distance for many stevne participants and the high cost of gasoline, it was felt that a travel alternative should be explored. The estimated cost will be up to \$125 round trip depending where you live. The bus will follow I-94 with stops along the way. It will leave Oconomowoc on noon Saturday, July 21. May 2012 Telesoga Features Dr. Hamlet Peterson



A cover story on Dr. Hamlet A. Peterson, distinguished Mayo Clinic orthopedic surgeon, is contained in the May issue of *Telesoga*. Known familiarly as "Ham", Dr. Peterson, a fifth generation, full-blooded Norwegian-American is a descendant of emigrants from the Rjukan area of Telemark. His father was an instructor and coach of multiple sports at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa

for forty-five years. His great-great-grandparents are Aslaug Einung and Hans Tveito, prominent in the Muskego, Wisconsin settlement. Ham attended Luther where he was a star quarterback for the Luther Norseman football team. As an orthopedic surgeon at Mayo, Ham has made major contributions to the advancement of orthopedic surgery including a technique for healing growth plate fractures in young patients.

The May *Telesoga* also includes articles on Norway's first rock star, Lars Fykerud; John Thoe, modern day Telemark craftsman: Thordis Langerud's sisters, Marie and Petra; and two articles by Elaine Bergan of Lake Mills, Iowa .


Over a Century of Celebrating our Telemark Heritage

<u>Telemark to America, Volume I — Emigration</u>



In 1837 the first Telemark emigrants set off for America beginning a stream of thousands starting a new life in a strange land. They retained a love for Telemark that has been passed down through the generations. This volume is a collection of articles written both by authors from Telemark and Americans with roots in Telemark, as well as translation of articles written long ago. It tells as complete but concise a story of Telemark emigration as possible and gives insight into the country that the immigrants left behind.


Telemark to America, Volume II—Settlements



Volume II is rich with settlement history from Wisconsin, Iowa, and Minnesota. All the chapters are translations from the early *Telesoga* written by Torkel Oftelie. Torkel visited most of the Telemark settlements in the above mentioned states between the years of 1907 to 1926. The first issue of *Telesoga*, published in 1909, contained the first settlement history. Torkel documented not only names of those living in these settlements, but also the stories of their ancestors - the first settlers in these areas.


NEW! Telemark to America, Volume III— Settlements,

Volume III of the *Telemark to America* series was published and released in July, 2011. The book is divided into three parts: articles on settlement history, biographies, and Telemark folklore. Much of the content was provided by Torkel Oftelie where he spent over 20 years visiting the settlements and documenting the lives of the Telemark emigrants. Torkel was concerned about maintaining the rich Telemark heritage. It is a valuable resource in searching for your Telemark ancestors and farms.

"A Year on Haugo Farm" by Ingebjorg Draugedal



This is the English version of the book in which the author - who now lives in Kviteseid, Telemark, Norway - tells of her life as a young girl in 1945, growing up under Nazi occupation on a farm in Telemark that was still as self-sufficient as those our emigrant ancestors left in the 1800's. The book recounts how they shared the work, the hardships and the pleasures of living on a close-knit family farm. It describes in detail the practical work that was done on the farm.

- The **2012 7-Lag Stevne** will be held at the Olympia Resort and Conference Center, 1350 Royale Road, Oconomowoc, WI, 53066 TEL 1-800-558-9573 WEB www.olympiaresort.com. It is located about 1 1/2 miles off of Interstate-94 at the Hwy 67 (Summit Road) exit north. There is an Olympia sign at the left to Royale Mile Road.
- The **theme** this year is "A **Norwegian Christmas in July**" or "**Jul i juli**". The Resort air conditioning has been up- graded and the manager suggests that if you get cold easily, you should "bring a sweater to classes" as the whole complex is on one thermostat and not easily changed. You are encouraged to decorate your room and your door if you can. We may have a prize for the best decorated door.
- As this is a resort area and July is their high season, **motel rates** in the area will be high. You can get a rate of \$79 a night plus tax at the Olympia by mentioning "7-Lag Stevne" when making reservations. The hotel is just completing a \$1.5 million renovation and it looked good before that. The rooms are large and comfortable with a small refrigerator, coffee maker and complimentary Internet connection in each room. For other hotels/motels/campgrounds in the area see below.
- Our Keynote speaker for the opening meeting on Thursday is Kathleen Ernst, who has a lively illustrated program about her 12-year tenure as an interpreter and curator at Old World Wisconsin, particularly the Norwegian area entitled "Lasting Legacy: Folklore and Stories Created and Inspired by Norwegian Immigrants." She has written many books. She will have a table outside the room for those who are interested in purchasing one of her books.
- The **Hospitality area** will be between the registration area and the vendors and staffed by Sigdal, Numedal and Telemark volunteers. We are hoping that you will contribute to the "goodies" by bringing some Norwegian Christmas treats. If your treat is unique, include the recipe if you wish. We will make copies if needed. Because the coffee has to be supplied by the resort and kind of expensive, there will be a donation basket nearby.
- Entertainment will consist of Sven and Ole will entertain us on Thursday night. This is an act that has been going for more than 30 years and gets better each year. <u>Old World Wisconsin Tour</u>: Thursday, July 19 - \$25 per adult; \$20 under 17

The Thursday tour to **Old World Wisconsin** starts at 10:30am and return about 4:15pm. This is an outdoor museum that includes working farmsteads and settlements recreating life in Wisconsin's European immigrant settlements, with a strong emphasis on Norwegian pioneers.

The museum's more than 60 historic structures range from ethnic farmsteads with furnished houses and rural outbuildings, to a crossroads village with its traditional small-town institutions. The efforts of countless historians have preserved an amazing slice of true Americana-one that will be enjoyed for generations to come. To create the museum, researchers traveled throughout Wisconsin in search of authentic historic buildings hewn by generations of Wisconsin settlers. Piece by piece, workers pains-



takingly dismantled the old structures and moved them to the site of Old World Wisconsin. Today the museum's historic farm and village buildings comprise the worlds largest museum dedicated to the history of rural life.

As the ride is short and the cost of tour buses have become very expensive, school buses will be used. Tram transportation between the exhibits is part of the ticket price. The tram is wheelchair accessible but much of the exhibit is on grass. They suggest that you call 262-594-6316 if you have limited mobility. Lunch is on your own, but there is a lunch area near the entrance. Near the entrance you'll find the Clausing Barn Restaurant, offering cafeteria-style dining on its lower level. Other options include a "Grab and Go" at the resort and a Subway on the way that the bus driver will stop for if there is enough interest. The bus will return to the Conference Center at 4:15pm.


<u>Harley-Davidson Museum and Pabst Brewery Tour</u>: Friday, July 15, 2010 - \$29 per person

The Friday tour to the **Harley-Davidson Museum and Pabst Brewery** starts at 10:30am and returns about 4:15pm. These venues are only a few blocks apart in Downtown Milwaukee. By the way, this whole area near the resort was once Pabst Farms and was used to grow hops and barley. Lunch is again on your own but both venues speak of impressive facilities. The Brewery tour includes a 16-ounce glass of beer if you are over 21 and Sprecher root beer (a treat in itself), if you are not.

The **Harley-Davidson Museum** is a North American museum near downtown, Milwaukee celebrating the more than 100 year history of Harley-Davidson motorcycles. The three-building complex along the Menomonee River bank contains more than 450 Harley-Davidson motorcycles and hundreds of thousands of artifacts from the Harley-Davidson Motor Company's 106 year history. The museum opened to the public on July 12, 2008. It was built in an historically industrial area of Milwaukee.



The original **Pabst Brewery** was founded in 1844 as The Empire Brewery, later Best and Company, by brewer Jacob Best. The brewery was run by Jacob and his sons. They started the brewery on Chestnut Street Hill in Milwaukee with a capacity of 18 barrels. In 1863, Frederick Pabst, a steamship captain and son-in-law of Phillip Best, bought a share in Phillip Best Brewing Co., by which time the brewery was already selling a lager that they began bottling in 1875. By 1874 Phillip Best Brewing Co. was the nation's largest brewer. Pabst was renowned in Milwaukee for its brewery tours. Pabst's sales reached a peak of 15.6 million barrels in 1978 and then went into steep decline. Most of its production was contracted out to the Stroh Brewing Co.'s La Crosse plant over the years until by 1996 all of it was and the historic brewery in Milwaukee was closed. Pabst was no longer brewed in Milwaukee after 152 years.
