Your New Telelaget Directors

Three new members were elected to Telelaget's Board of Directors at the July Annual Meeting. Joan Niemiec and Jerry Burmeister were elected to two year terms, replacing Jim Oftelie and Deanna Zentgraf. Mary Aslakson was elected to fill the one year term left by Judy Mathison's resignation.



Joan and her husband, Dick, live in Minneapolis, Minnesota and have a second home near Decorah, Iowa. Joan became interested in genealogy when she learned her

husband's ancestors were aboard the Mayflower. Several years ago, Joan learned at a *stevne* that some of her ancestors came from Telemark. They were Hans Torgerson Vinbek Finnemyr from Sauherad (Sande), Telemark (DOB 24 Jan 1830) and Anne Skogen (Madsdatter) (DOB 7 April, 1834).



Jerry grew up on a farm near Harmony Minnesota. His wife, Lila, is currently a Telelaget board member. They live near Atwater, Minnesota and have three children and four grandchildren. Jerry is the Consulting Manager at Interstate Telcom Consulting, Inc. in Hector. Jerry became interested in his Norwegian roots because of Lila's many years of research. According to his mother's DNA, she is 99 percent Norwegian with three of her grandparents emigrating from Telemark (Seljord, Tinn and Tokke). Jerry has visited the Telemark area twice, once on a family heritage trip through Norway in 2013, and again on the Telelaget Tour in 2016.



Mary and her husband, Elroy, live in Independence, Missouri. Their three children live in Jefferson City, Missiouri (2) and Coal Valley, Illinois. Mary got interested in

genealogy when her brother was working on the McKemy, Kirkpatrick, and Teaford family lines. Then Elroy got interested in his side of the family. Then they discovered the stevne and the friendly folks there — and they keep coming back!

The balance at the end of June was \$23,012.69. The Lag had a profit of \$696 from hosting the 2017 Stevne.

Connie Anderson donated the book Norsk Lutherske Menigheter I Amerika and Volumes 1 and 2 of Norwegian Migration to America by Blegen. Appreciation was given to Sandy Gilbert for arranging to have the Drangedal Bygdebok from the 1920s re-bound.

The total membership as of April 14 is 379, including 13 in Norway.



A devoted husband and loving father, Bill took pride in raising two sons, taking them in with open arms despite neither being his biological children. He was a pragmatist and a hard worker, a coowner of a successful manufacturing company with his wife and family until they retired. A man of faith, he acknowledged he wasn't perfect and didn't expect others to be, which meant he was always happy to talk and listen. Bill passed away at home, as he wished, surrounded by his wife, son, and dogs, on August 30th, 2018 at the age of 71. Bill will be deeply missed by his wife of 29 years, Judy Mathison, son Brandon (Abby) Krawczyk of San Antonio, Texas, brother Mark (Rachel) Stauffer, and other friends and family. Kristina M. (Torkelson) Gray, 62, of Crookston passed away unexpectedly Thursday, May 31, 2018 at her home. A funeral service was held Monday, June 4, in Crookston. Kristina was a graduate of Crookston High School, Concordia College in Moorhead, and the U of M in Minneapolis. She served in the Peace Corps in the Philippines and Kazakhstan and was a teacher in China and the Ukraine. Kristina formed a passion for telling stories of history, publishing two books about Polk county people and places. She wrote an article about S. A. Olsness for the Telesoga. Kristina is survived by her parents, Glen and Lucile Torkelson, and her husband, Ken Gray of Crookston, along with three step-children and other relatives and friends.



Arne Brekke. 90. of Grand Forks. ND, passed away on Monday, June 25, 2018. Born on a goat farm in rural Norway, the seventh of nine children, he came to America on scholarship to study at Luther College in Iowa and eventually earned a PhD from the University of Chicago. In the mid-1950's he started leading tours to Norway to fund his trips to visit family back in Norway. Over the years, Arne was able to pursue both his academic career and start a successful niche travel agency helping Norwegian Americans find their roots in Norway. In recent years, he started a collection of books at the University of North Dakota Chester Fritz Library related to Norwegian genealogy and cultural history. New Mission Book for those interested in Mission and Church life in America

This new book, To the Ends of the Earth, by Torbjørn Greipsland, shows clearly how seriously the missionaries took their service. They knew that it could cost them their own life and health, persecution, kidnapping and murder. But they went. They

saw some of the results, we see great results.

Two missionary families from Telemark are presented. Two siblings, Thea and Halvor Rønning, from Bø in Telemark said "yes" to God's call and became pioneer

missionaries in China in a difficult time, but the mission work bore fruit. Kittil Braaten from Telemark and his wife, Anna Marie (Stenseth) from Etnedal, Valdres also became missionaries. The book has the names of more than a thousand missionaries, and articles about, or interviews with, 30 of them. It is exciting reading.

One reason for writing the book is that the extensive missionary commitment that existed in many churches, and still continues, has not been given any important place in the central and general history books about the Norwegian America. These missionaries deserve a book!
