Telelaget's 2020 Vision of Norway July 27 — August 9



Plans are being made for our 2020 trip to Norway encompassing Norway's Telemark region in addition to Trondheim, Lillehammer, Fagernes and Oslo. Mailings and emails giving the details of, and application for the trip were sent about a month ago. If you did not receive one, go to www.telelaget.com and click on 2020 Telemark Tour at the top of the page.

Brekke Tours is currently accepting early registrations. A fully refundable \$400 per person deposit (paid by check) will secure your place on the tour with registrations accepted on a first-come; first-served basis. Estimated tour pricing with air/taxes/and fuel will be \$4300 per person, with a single room supplement of \$695.

Highlights of the tour will be the Nidaros Cathedral, Maihaugen, Glass Cathedral, Lake Mjøsa cruise, Vemork, West-Telemark Museum, Vigeland Park, Viking Ship Museum, and much more. The Telelaget tour combines must-see landmarks with an opportunity to visit the places and, when possible, meet family members, of participants' Telemark ancestors. Members in the US work closely with our Norwegian liaisons to create a unique and meaningful experience.

Past Telemark tours have sold out quickly, so if you are thinking of going on this trip, get your deposit in to Brekke today!



It's not too early to start thinking about next summer's 7-Lag Stevne in Duluth! We'll be in the heart of the city at the waterfront with an up-close view of the Lift Bridge in the Harborside Convention Center, part of the Duluth Entertainment complex (DECC).

The *stevne* will begin on Wednesday, July 8, with an open house and a harbor dinner cruise. Thursday and Friday offers classes and entertainment, and a Telelaget activity will be planned for Friday. Saturday there will be classes followed by the banquet.

Duluth is a hot summer destination, and hotels run \$200 and up. We have a 'great' rate of \$169/night at the Holiday Inn connected by skyway to DECC, or an economical alternative — dorm rooms at UMD (about 15 minutes away).

The program will include Viking re-enactors, presentations about Norwegians on the North Shore and Viking settlements in places like Greenland, Iceland, and Newfoundland, craft classes and activities for students. On Sunday, enjoy a bus tour of the North Shore from 9-5.



The Annual Meeting of Telelaget, held at the Holiday Inn in Fargo ND during our 2019 *stevne*, was attended by 38 Telelaget members.

Our membership on July 10, 2019 was 352. This includes 38 Lifetime Members.

Members were encouraged to visit our updated website, and to submit articles to both the website and the *Telesoga*. Elaine Nordlie, Tour Director gave information on the July 27 - August 9, 2020 tour to Norway.

There was one opening on the Board of Directors, and Madelyn Krinke was elected by a ballot vote to fill the three-year term.

Madelyn was born and grew up in Mora, Minnesota. She attended the University of Minnesota for one year, then married her high school sweetheart, Arlen, while he was a student at Concordia College, St. Paul, Minnesota They have now celebrated their 53rd wedding anniversary.

Madelyn has worked as an administrative assistant most of her adult years. Working full time for administrators of city or schools while raising their family of five daughters consumed most hours of

Madelyn retired in 2014 and a few years later became interested in her family history. A friend showed her how to do the research and what a *lag* and *stevne* were. Madelyn attended her first *stevne* in 2018, just prior to taking a tour of Norway.

Madelyn's father's ancestry is documented in the Wrolstad Family History book back to the 1300s. She plans to join the 2020 tour to Norway and visit the Vralstad farm(s) and two other ancestors' home sites, one in Ringsacker and the other in the Hof area.

Her new goal is to complete her search for ancestors to the extent possible and to record the history in a book for her descendants and others in her family.

A Stevne Surprise

We were very pleasantly surprised at this year's *stevne* when Telelaget member, Trygve Olson, brought in to the genealogy room a framed panoramic photo of a Telelaget *Stevne* held 99 years ago in Moorhead, Minnesota. This very historic photo was taken on June 25, 1920 by Moorhead's premier photographer O. E. Flaten and preserves the images of over 300 *stevne* attendees. It was quite interesting and also great fun to see all those people in the fashions of the day, most of whom were wearing their Telelaget *Stevne* souvenir ribbons. Our Historian, Jim Skree took several photos of the panoramic, and those sections are printed below.

In the center of the picture (top two photos on the next page) stands a row of ten women proudly attired in their Telemark, and other, *bunads*. Sitting on the ground to the far right (bottom center on the next page) are four fiddle players with instruments in hand. Imagine how much fun they must have had visiting, listening to music, dancing, eating, hearing various speakers, and just in general

soaking in what must have been a powerful and koselig Telemark vibe!

There was nothing written on the back, so no identifications of any of the people, except for the fact that John Haugo and Joran Olson each found their grandfathers on the photo. John Haugo's grandfather is in the center of the first photo in the bottom row on this page. He's the tall one that looks like John with short dark tie, watch chain on front of pants, and hand in pocket. Joran's grandfather is in the bottom center section on the next page. He is in the back, tall with dark hair and











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mustache and *stevne* ribbon on left lapel. He stands in line with the second fiddler in that section.

It is next to impossible at this late date to make any identifications, except for a few well-known members and perhaps members of the board whose pictures have been preserved.

Jim Skree knew that the man sitting on the ground in front of the women in *bunads* (second photo, top row below) looking straight to the left with mustache and goatee, and a white kerchief in his pocket, is Edwin Studlien, an officer in the Telelaget from the Buffalo River Settlement. Even though his roots were not in Telemark, he obviously gained access by living in a Telemark settlement and by being married to Ingeborg Roholt, a *Telemarksjente* (Telemark girl) from Vrådal.

Webmaster Anne Sladky said it would be nice if this photograph could be scanned by the folks at NAHA. They have a collection of panoramic photos taken at early 20th century *bygdelag* functions and are asking for more. They can be viewed online and are of a very good quality.

The Telelaget website contains a wealth of information for descendant of Norwegian-American settlers to learn about the land, customs, and lives of their Norwegian families from Telemark. Our webmaster recently gave us the following statistics regarding the use of our website, between April 2018 and April 2019. 1,548 different visitors made 3,064 visits, viewing 7,780 pages. 86% reached the site by direct link, 7% via a search engine and 7% from another site, most often Fellesraad or Facebook. The most popular pages were What's New and Genealogy Homepage, and most popular sections were Telemark, Genealogy, Lag and Pioneers.

One of the stops on Telelaget's *Vision of Norway*" Tour will be Vemork, the hydroelectric power plant, where the Nazis produced "heavy water" for their atomic bomb experiments. Our visit includes your choice of a guided tour of the recently-opened heavy water cellar, or an (easy hiking) Saboteur Hike in the Hardanger Plateau to the Saboteur's cabin.

An excellent book to prepare for either of these options is *Winter Fortress: The Epic Mission to Sabotage Hitler's Atomic Bomb* by Neal Bascomb. The book is based on a trove of top-secret documents and never-before-seen diaries and letters of the saboteurs.

We will be hearing about the *Bonde* (Farmers) revolt while we are in Flatdal, and we will also enjoy a presentation by a local silversmith at the Gaustablikk hotel. 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Thortvedt Family Subject of Research by Vest Telemark Museum

A very ambitious project which Shelley Jerviss and I have been peripherally involved with concerns the Vest Telemark Museum (previously called the Lårdal Museum, next to the Eidsborg Stave Church) regarding the Buffalo River Settlement, about eight miles east of Moorhead, which was featured in our very first issue of *Telesoga* back in 1909. The VTM director, Dag Rorgemoen, and public program coordinator, Tilman Hartenstein, came to the midwest area in March stopping at Vesterheim Museum in Decorah to do some research, so Shelley I met them there.


The focus of their research and planned exhibition will be on the large, extended Gjeitestad/Gedstad and Tortveit/ Thortvedt (siblings) family who came from Fyresdal to Houston, Minnesota (in Houston County) in 1861. The VTM guys wanted to gather information about the pioneer's lives and where they lived in rural Houston

before migrating up to the Red River Valley, settling along the Buffalo River in 1870 and 1871. They were the first in that area and together with those that followed for the next several years the settlement became Houston's largest Norwegian colony. Those pioneers built their own church, later called Concordia, and regard the Stone Church Congregation back in Houston (whose church they also help to build) to be their "Mother Church." The following day, Shelly and I took the guys on an extended tour of that church, and they were very intrigued by all the familiar names in the cemetery.

The Thortvedt branch will be representative of all the pioneers in the Buffalo River settlement, since they above all others kept such extensive and detailed records about their lives, from the 400 mile trip from Houston to Moorhead and subsequent years building up their farms, to taking great pleasure and satisfaction in being a part of a very successful immigrant community composed almost

exclusively of Norwegians from Fyresdal and Vrådal in West Telemark.

Levi Thortvedt and several of his daughters kept diaries and journals much of their lives and also wrote history. Daughter, Orabel, was especially prolific and being an accomplished artist, she also richly illustrated many of her writings. The family archives, recently donated to the Historical and Cultural Society of Clay County, located in the *Hjemkomst* Center at Moorhead, contains hundreds of early, identified photographs, and the diaries, journals, scrapbooks, etcetera, take up 50 feet of shelf space. Really a mind-blowing collection!

Dag Rorgemoen has been the director of the VTM since 1999 and has seen the Museum through many changes and improvements, not the least of which was an architecturally striking expansion of the main Museum building. The opening is scheduled for some time in 2020, and we're all looking forward very much to seeing what the folks at Vest Telemark Museum will do with all the treasures they have surely discovered on their research trip to the Midwest.
