

THE LUREN SINGERS

We are excited to include a performance by the Luren Singers to close out our mini-stevne, "Giants who came Before," in Spring Grove in April. Just who are the Luren Singers? According to an article in the Winnnesheik County, Iowa Biographies book printed in 1996, four young men who had emigrated from Norway met in Decorah on March 17, 1868, to form the Luren Quartet. The group got their name from a double quartet one member had heard near his boyhood home near Christiania (now Oslo), called Luren. The name refers to the long horn used often in the mountains of Norway to send messages.

Luren remains the oldest Norwegian American singing society in continuous existence in this country. Luren has been a member chorus of the Norwegian Singers Association of America for many years, and has been a mainstay as one of the largest choruses of NSAA.

Luren continues its tradition of singing in many settings: anniversaries, celebrations, receptions, church and civic occasions, and its regular concerts in and around Decorah. Annual Meeting Held Via Zoom



Telelaget of America held their Annual Meeting via Zoom on Saturday, September 25. There was one opening on the Board of Directors vacated by Doug Framness who has served the maximum of two three-year terms as accorded by our by-laws. 'Thank you' to Doug, who has been the vice-president of Telelaget, for his time and contributions to our organization.

Completing their first three-year terms on the board were Jerry Burmeister and Joan Niemiec. Both agreed to remain on the board for a second three-year term.

Sara Gordon was on the ballot to fill the board position. In her biography, Sara states, "I live in Southern California. My mother was born and raised in St. Paul and was very proud of her Norwegian and Swedish heritage. She learned about Norway from her grandmother who was from the Tinn area of Telemark. Passing down the love of family traditions, cooking and genealogy



was very important to her. I joined the last trip to Telemark which only deepened my love of and interest in my Norwegian heritage. I am currently an adjunct professor at a community college and look forward to my impending retirement so I can spend more time researching and learning about my ancestors. I am also currently a member of the Hadeland Lag and am a member of the DAR on my father's side." Welcome, Sara, to Telelag's Board of Directors.

Membership in Telelaget of America is currently at 354, which includes 51 lifetime members and 22 complementary memberships. This is up slightly from our 2020 membership of 349.

The Treasurer's Report for 2020 showed a balance of \$19,661.44 on January 1, 2020. Income for the year 2020 was \$10,055.80 with \$8,209.98 in expenses. This leaves a balance of \$21,507.26 as of December 31, 2020. Most of our income is from membership dues, and our largest expense is for printing and mailing the Telesoga and TeleNews.

History of Syttende Mai presented by Terje Mikael Hasle Joranger. Syttende Mai is the most important national holiday in Norway. It celebrates the signing of the Norwegian Constitution on May 17, 1814. Terje Mikael Hasle Joranger from Norway talked about the history of Syttende Mai. Terje has a background as a migration and ethnic history scholar and is director of the Norwegian Emigrant Museum im Hamar, Norway.

Hymns of My Great-Grandfather presented by Telelag member, Sandra Fjelstad Gilbert. In this presentation, Sandy discusses the stories of her great-grandparents, Reverend Rolf Knutson (Rollefson) Fjelstad and Sylvia Persdatter Wangsness, the churches they attended and served, and a treasured book of hymns Rolf had composed and authored, some of which are played during the presentation.

Scandinavian Blacksmithing at Goose Prairie Forge presented by Doug Swenson. Doug talks about his working blacksmith shop in Hawley, Minnesota. Doug has gained attention from both National and International Audiences and has appeared on the show "America's Lost Vikings." He is working with researchers to help recreate tools from the late Viking Age based on archaeological finds from Scandinavia. You will gain insight into a craft that has gained new interest.

The Pilgrim's Trail presented by Jahn Børe Jahnssen. Noted historian Jahn Børe Jahnsen from Valdres, Norway shared a presentation about the popular Pilgrimsleden or Pilgrims Trail in Norway. You will hear the history of the trails and see maps and various trail markers. Jahn shared some of his own personal pictures from when he has walked the trails himself. They all lead to Trondheim!

Family Search Norway Wiki Page presented by Jeff Svare. This presentation focuses on Norwegian genealogical content in the FamilySearch Research Wiki. The presentation includes Wiki content related to Norwegian Historical Records collections available on FamilySearch and Nordic material available on the FamilySearch Learning Center. There's much more to the Wiki than you may be familiar with, and there's sure to be something new for you to learn!

"The Midwestern Notebooks of Talleiv Sveinungsen Vindlaus" by Øyvind Gulliksen appeared in the May 2021 issue of the Telesoga. The journal was found in the attic of Lillian (Orvella) Bruvold's father, Helmer. The Orvella family asked Don Berg to translate the journal and Joan (Soland) Landenberger offered to type it. Don and Joan spent over four years

translating, typing, researching, and laying out the journal. Joan contacted relatives and was able to add a few photos of relatives mentioned in the journal. The project seemed overwhelming at first, but what a tremendous look back into the lives of these Norwegian immigrants. The publication of the project was completed July 6, 2020. Don and Joan had hoped to have a book signing, but COVID-19 caused a postponement. Unfortunately, the signing was never held as Don had a stroke on December 21 and died January 10, 2021. Don had sent a book to Øyvind Gulliksen in Bø, Telemark last year. Øyvind wrote an article for the Vest-Telemark Newspaper in November 2020. This is the article that was translated and published in the Telesoga. Frieda E. Nowland

Frieda E. Nowland, 87, of La Crosse passed away Friday, April 2, 2021, at her home. Born in Spring Grove, Minnesota, July 2, 1933, to Palmer and Margit (Landsverk) Mindrum, she was baptized at Highland Prairie Lutheran Church and confirmed at Houston Lutheran Church. She graduated from Houston High School in 1950, from Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, in 1954, and later earned library credentials from UW-Whitewater and a master's degree in media from UW-La Crosse.

Frieda married Ron Nowland in 1955, while he was a student at Luther Theological

Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota. They had three children, Paul, Naomi, and Jonathan and later adopted Grace, when she was 10 years old.

In addition to raising her family, she worked as a bookkeeper and secretary. She taught social studies, was a librarian, the program director and volunteer coordinator at Norskedalen Nature and Heritage Center and owned and operated a Lutheran bookstore for before retiring in 2002.

Frieda's hobbies included reading, writing (especially family stories), crossword puzzles, cryptograms, traveling, bicycling, and helping Ron with his illustrated talks. Frieda was a long-time Telelag member.

Tell your stories. Share your heritage. Pass it on

Frieda's daughter, Naomi, wrote and read the following at Frieda's funeral: "All her life, mom enjoyed informing people that she was 100% Norwegian. All four of her grandparents could point to exactly where in Norway they came from. I owe my connection to and fascination with Norway to my mom and her love of storytelling. I grew up hearing stories of long-ago relatives.

"In the spring of my senior year of high school, I had an opportunity to spend six-weeks in Norway, traveling with another high school senior. Guess what? My mom was all for it. Two eighteen-year-old girls by themselves in Norway. What could possibly go wrong? Thankfully, nothing did. We saw a lot of the country. In every major city we stayed in, as soon as I checked into the hotel, or the youth hostel or a person's home, there would be a letter waiting for me written by mom. She knew my schedule. She looked ahead and made sure to post each letter in time for it to be waiting for me. It didn't matter that the news might be old, or mundane. No, what mattered was that mom cared enough to write. Mind you, this was before cell phones, before

Skype, before Facetime. For six weeks, the only communication I had was via letters. Well, except for the telegram I sent home when I kinda, ran short of money.

"As I grew up, I learned lots of common Norwegian phrases that translate as: thanks for the food, thanks for the visit, I'm hungry, I'm full, I'm tired, I'm ready, I don't know, how are you doing, I'm fine thanks, can you speak Norwegian, and more. Mom even got my son to speak Norwegian. After each visit, once he could drive, mom would look Zachary in the eye and say, "kjør forsiktig" and he'd reply, "ta da med ro." Translated, she said, "Drive safely." And he acknowledged her instruction by responding in the affirmative that he would, "Take it easy."


"A few years ago, mom had her DNA tested. Imagine her surprise when it came back that she was only 94% Norwegian. The other percent? Divided evenly among Irish, Russian and Finnish. I tell you, those Vikings sure got around. If that's the total extent of scandal we can find, we're doing pretty good. Except, there's that story about a well-to-do farmer's daughter who fell in love with the hired hand. But that was back in Norway, a long time ago.

"Mom took at least six trips to Norway. I was privileged to join her on her last trip which was just five years ago. In helping to set up that trip, Mom insisted I contact Inger who lives in Norway so that we could stay with her. Now, this was a woman mom had met for all of 30 minutes. But Inger reportedly told mom that 'the next time you're in Norway, come stay with me.' When I questioned mom about the wisdom of contacting this Inger, mom said, "Well, I can certainly tell when someone means what they say." Indeed, we had a delightful two-day visit in Inger's home.

"Thirty some years ago, mom purchased a custom-made Eastern Telemark bunad, a beloved traditional Norwegian garment that is unique for specific regions and is worn on special occasions. A woman's bunad is a colorful dress made of wool that is adorned with embroidery, buckles, shawls, scarfs and handmade silver jewelry. Over the years, mom acquired all the extras. Yes, a bunad is quite the investment. This past Christmas, mom insisted that I take her bunad home with me. It will be my honor to wear it. Thank you, mom, "takk mor," for delighting so much in your heritage, that I also came to embrace... from whence I come."

A YEAR AT HAUGO FARM

"A Year at Haugo Farm" was published by the Vest-Telemark Museum. Telelaget sells and mails copies of the book in the United States and Canada.

Author Ingebjørg Draugedal, who now lives in Kviteseid, Telemark, Norway, tells of her life as a girl in 1945, growing up under Nazi occupation on a farm in Telemark that was still as self-sufficient as those our emigrant ancestors left in



the 1800's. How did people back then provide for nearly everything they needed themselves?

In the book Ingebjørg recounts how they shared the work, the hardships and the pleasures of living on a close-knit family farm. The book describes in detail the practical work that was done on the farm, but it also tells about the relationships between the family members and within the local community, and about the intimate interaction with the surrounding landscape. Ingebjørg's vivid reminiscences breathe life into what is now a bygone era for most of us.

RED RIVER GIRL—THE ART OF ORABEL THORTVEDT



This popular new book is a main focus of our mini-stevne, "Giants who came Before," to be held April 1-3 in Spring Grove, Minnesota. You'll have the opportunity to see where Orabell lived, hear of her life in Houston County, and visit the display at the Houston County Historical Society.

The book is the result of a cooperative effort between the West-Telemark Museum in Eidsborg and the Historical and Cultural Society of Clay County, Moorhead, Minnesota. Published in 2020, the text is both in Norwegian and English.

Orabel Thortvedt, granddaughter of pioneer Olav G. Geitestad/Thortvedt, devoted much of her life exploring and depicting her story. She was a trained artist, loved animals and was inordinately interested in local history. This book portrays the work of this fascinating artist, while at the same time telling a touching family saga.

The 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 13 inch hardcover book weighs in at over three pounds, and its 193 pages are printed on luxurious, semi-gloss, art silk paper, profusely illustrated with black & white and color photographs, including numerous scans of Orabel's artwork. The book should be of interest to all who appreciate and enjoy the history of Norwegian immigration to the Upper Midwest in the 19th century. If you don't know your families story, you can imagine it was much like that described by Orabel in her book.

Cost for the book is \$45.00 plus \$5.00 shipping.

Telesoga DVD

My Huldra

When we first moved to our home in Clear Lake, lowa, way too many years ago, my parents gave me this Norwegian Huldra as a house-warming gift. Huldras are the females of the species. The males are called Huldrekall. They are usually

farmers who have superior farms and better livestock than any of their human neighbors.

Huldrefolk are mostly born in forests and mountain regions far away from prying eyes. The females start out life with great beauty and alluring singing voices. However, their beauty comes with a price. They are born with a cow's tail they desperately try to hide. Their main goal in life is to achieve equality with humans. As such they use their beauty and their melodic singing voice to seduce a man so that he will marry her in a church. If she does, her tail falls off and she can pass for human.

So, why is my Huldra not beautiful? Well, if a Huldra fails to marry in a church, she quickly becomes shriveled and ugly. And just where is her tail? I theorize that because of her great age, my Huldra's tail just fell off on its own. However, as Huldras grow older, they also mellow. I was told that if you are kind to them, they will be kind in return. Therefore, I have made it a habit to be especially nice to my Huldra. So far, she hasn't caused me any trouble and I hope to keep it that way.




Don't miss out on this fun and educational weekend! The Friday night Revy and all speaker presentations


